

# **ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ALLIANCE**

The Economic Development Alliance (EDA) is a public/private partnership with the City of Bolivar, the County of Polk, the Industrial Development Authority, and investors from the Public / Private Sector.

**Purpose**: Through the development of the EDA, a robust Economic Development Program has been established. We are now in a position to advocate and advance a sustainable, job-driven business climate and to diversify economic opportunity that may impact all of Polk County. The purpose of this organization is to develop, advance, encourage and promote commercial, industrial, agricultural, tourism and manufacturing growth in and around the City of Bolivar and Polk County, Missouri. Through the public/private partnership of the City and County Government entities, the local Chamber of Commerce and area businesses, the promotion of economic development in our area becomes a team sport.

<u>Structure</u>: Committing to sponsorship in the EDA encourages local entities and businesses to hold an equitable partnership in growing jobs and investment in the Polk County region. Under this structure, stakeholders participate in regional economic development, such as business attraction and retention activities, and gain access to professional economic development staff and other resources across the region and state.

Each sponsor commits to a preferred sponsorship level on a three-year commitment, which is subject to their annual approval.

Mission Statement: The Economic Development Alliance – Bolivar and Polk County coordinates and facilitates the development of a strong, diversified and competitive economy in the city and county. As a public/private partnership, the EDA focuses on addressing the needs and opportunities of existing businesses, providing assistance to new and expanding businesses, fostering workforce development, supporting an entrepreneurial culture, while advocating for a business-friendly climate in Bolivar.


### FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ...



- Developed & implemented Business Surveys to determine current needs / challenges during lockdown at onset of COVID-19
- Held weekly Zoom meetings with City's business license holders
- Participated in webinars / Zoom meetings with DED, MEDC, MSAE, local health department, ICSC
- Served as a resource for Financial and Disaster Relief programs for local businesses

### Business Retention & Expansion

- Assisted organizations and local businesses as they sought direction and help throughout the Pandemic
- Directed local businesses to the appropriate state, regional or local organizations for help during COVID-19

- Attended Missouri Rural Development Partners State Board meetings
- Met with Mo. DED Director Rob Dixon, Sen. Sandy Crawford and Dallas County for possible ED partnership
- Visited the community of Excelsior Springs
- Held Zoom meeting with Springfield Area HBA association in regard to housing needs
- Survey sent to HBA membership and local builders
- Submitted letters to be considered for a grant through SBDC Supercharge Southwest Missouri Initiative
- Compiled all documentation needed to have the Business Park recertified through the Missouri Department of Economic Development for another 3 years

## Ongoing Projects

- Submitted 11 RFIs for Leads through Springfield Regional Economic Partnership as well as local leads, totaling 19 for year
- Maintained close contact with Plant Manager and other White River Marine / Tracker leadership prior to announcement of expansion
- Held weekly phone meetings with Tracker regarding workforce
- Had close contact and weekly phone meetings with the Pleasant Hope Beef Production Facility – Missouri Prime Beef Packers – in regard to incentives / workforce / grand opening




# What types of businesses answered our survey?


Length of Time in Business; Number of Employees; Type of Service Provided


